

Water Treatment Plant Focus of March 27 Meeting

Modern Landfill is investing \$23 million to upgrade the facility

YORK, Pa. (Mar. 7, 2023) – Residents can ask questions about Modern Landfill's new \$23 million wastewater treatment plant, hear updates about the construction process and learn more about the advanced technology being deployed on site.

Modern Landfill is hosting a community meeting at 6:30 p.m. Monday, March 27, in the gymnasium of the Lower Windsor Township Municipal Building to provide an update. The York Dispatch recently featured details about the meeting in a story published a few weeks ago.

In 2017, Modern Landfill fell out of compliance with the Penn-sylvania Department of Eavi-ronmental Protection limits on certain chemicals in its leachate. certai chemicals in its leachate hen, the landfill has

Earlier this year, local media toured the site to get a firsthand look at the work being done. Click here to check out some of the photos. Today, the plant is more than two-thirds finished and on track for opening later this year.

Upgrades include installation of massive water storage tanks and advanced reverse osmosis technology. These newer, advanced treatment methods are recognized as capable of treating PFAS, too.

The community meeting will include remarks by Modern Landfill's General Manager Tim O'Donnell and give residents access to environmental managers, engineers, scientists, and senior leaders so they can understand fully Modern Landfill's operations, its proposed expansion plans, and the company's ongoing commitment to protect public health and the environment through investments like this new wastewater treatment plant.
